2003 - 2023 His infuence at El Thayeba

When the stallion El Thay Mahfouz died last year, only a few days short of his 20th birthday, he left a huge hole both in the heart and the breeding program of his breeder and owner, Cornelia Tauschke. The culmination of decades of breeding and planning, he was everything a breeder could hope for: a horse of almost transcendent beauty, a trusted companion under saddle, and a prepotent sire whose influence shaped the El Thayeba stud for the past two decades.

It is actually a miracle this horse even existed.

Back in 1977, the late Dr. Hans-Jörg Tauschke purchased his great-granddam, Momtaza, from the Bábolna State Stud of Hungary. Bred by the Egyptian State Stud El Zahraa, Momtaza was a rare Sameh daughter out of Mamlouka by Nazeer, from the Kohailan Rodan family. She was a beautiful mare; not with the extremely dished face favoured these days, but with the biggest, most beautiful eyes you could imagine.

But there was one problem. After she had produced her first daughter at Bábolna, Momtaza wouldn't get in foal again.

When several years had passed with nothing to show, she was put up for sale.

Dr. Tauschke, however, never shied away from a challenge. He bought not just one, but two presumably infertile Egyptian mares from Bábolna: El Thayeba and Momtaza. While El Thayeba remained barren, leaving the stud only her name, Momtaza rose to the challenge and produced her second and last daughter: a look-alike grey filly that was named Morawa. Just to make things even more miracolous, Morawa's sire, Nizam, was also thought to be sterile at the time.

Morawa, then, was a true miracle filly: by a supposedly infertile stallion out

of a supposedly barren mare. Less surprisingly, she was a keeper and never left the stud. As a broodmare, she was everything her dam was not, producing seven daughters and three sons (by eight different stallions). All of them bred on. Momtaza's family became one of the mainstays of the El Thayeba breeding program, and both Morawa and her eldest daughter were honored with the "Elite" title by the German registry.

Five of Morawa's daughters became El Thayeba broodmares, but only one, the oldest, was retained her entire life, becoming one of the stud's most treasured mares: the beautiful chestnut El Thay Mansoura (by Machmut). Most

of her foals were colts, the best-known being the stallion El Thay Mameluk (by Ibn Nazeema). He stood for a while at El Thayeba, was leased to Momtaza's former home, Bábolna, and eventually exported to Kuwait. Mansoura's first filly died before she could produce any foals, but the next one, El Thay Mahfouza, was another keeper. She was sired by the homebred stallion El Thay Ibn Halim Shah, and it was she who became the dam of El Thay Mahfouz. It should be noted here that, although many horses of this family were sold, this core family line - Morawa, El Thay Mansoura, El Thay Mahfouza, and indeed El Thay Mahfouz himself remained at El Thayeba their entire lives. You don't often find that, these days.

El Thay Mahfouz's sire was Ansata Selman (Ansata Hejazi x G Shafaria by Prince Fa Moniet). He has been acknowledged as the most significant sire used at El Thayeba since Ansata Halim Shah, who was his grandsire. Cornelia Tauschke first saw him as a 2-year-old at Al Rayyan Stud in Qatar and was impressed by his presence and his excellent movement, as well as the overall longer lines coming from Prince Fa Moniet, which she felt she needed for her horses. In 2002 she was able to lease him and bring him to Germany, where he was awarded a gold premium on registration. He stayed for the next four years, first on lease and eventually purchased in exchange for the homebred stallion El Thay Mashour, before he was sold on to Al Waab Stud in Qatar. During his four years at El Thayeba, he left a rich legacy our four daughters of two sons. Of these, El Thay Mahfouz was arguably his greatest achievement.

El Thay Mahfouza had been following in der dam's footsteps by producing one colt after another, of which the first was exported and the next two gelded. She was among the first mares bred to Ansata Selman in 2002.

When her fourth foal arrived in 2003, it was yet another colt, but this one was

different. Cornelia immediately knew he was special. He had that something extra, a certain charm and grace that captured the hearts of all who saw him. He was one of two colts by Ansata Selman retained as future stallions, the other being El Thay Melek (out of El Thay Maheera). Both of them were eventually registered as breeding stallions, and both were used as sires. But while Melek sired just a handful of horses before being gelded and becoming a riding horse, Mahfouz went on to become the sire that took El Thayeba into the 21st century.

He was shown lightly as a youngster by Johanna Ullström and brought home a

few ribbons, but he never was a proper show horse. He needed time to mature. Then, like all stallions at El Thayeba, he was broken to saddle by Cornelia and regularly taken out on rides, often accompanied by other family members. He always behaved impeccably when ridden, even in the company of mares.

But his real strength was as a breeding stallion. Seven of his daughters were retained as broodmares, and the herd at El Thayeba today is very much his creation. He reliably passed on his exquisite refinement and huge eyes, making his daughters easy to recognize, although – with the exception of two

full sisters – they were all out of different mares.

The two full sister El Thay Konouz and El Thay Kahila are out of El Thay Kamla (El Thay Mashour x Kamla II), from the stud's arguably most successful dam line, tracing to the Dahmah Shahwanieh strain through Moheba II. Both of them have produced several daughters, Konouz's most recent one being a 2024 filly by Naseem Al Rashediah. Her daughter El Thay Kenana has produced two exquisite fillies that are linebred to El Thay Mahfouz, of which the older one is being retained. They are sired by the stud's young homebred stallion El Thay

Kais Al Sabah, who is out of another Mahfouz daughter, El Thay Kateefa Al Sabah, from the same dam line. He has the most spectacular movements and has already sired some exquisite foals. His dam El Thay Kateefa Al Sabah has also produced the ultra-typey young mare El Thay Komeira Al Sabah, by NK Nabhan. El Thay Mazyouna (El Thay Mahfouz x El Thay Malikah by Ansata Selman) was the result of breeding El Thay Mahfouz to his paternal half-sister. She was very successful at shows as a filly and has produced two daughters for the stud. Her daughter El Thay Mofida (by El Thay Karim Shah) is expecting her first foal this year.

El Thay Toya (El Thay Mahfouz x El Thay Taqiyah by Ansata Selman) is another successful result of breeding Mahfouz to a Selman daughter, and she is the mare Cornelia has named as the closest to her ideal she has every bred. It's easy to see why. With her ethereal beauty and big, soulful eyes, Toya is the very image of her sire and possibly the most beautiful mare at the stud. Her family, that of Venus/Hadban Enzahi through Taghreed, was nearly gone from the stud at one time. If it had not been for Toya, it may well have been, so the credit for reviving it belongs to El Thay Mahfouz.

El Thay Munifa (El Thay Mahfouz x El Thay Malakah) is another example of successful linebreeding with Mahfouz, her sire and dam being maternal half-siblings out of El Thay Mahfouza. The

El Thay Mahfouz was first and foremost an excellent broodmare sire who left a legacy of wonderful daughters. Nearly all of them were bred at El Thayeba. Mahfouz was never much advertised at stud and bred only a few outside mares. There was some interest in leasing him, especially from the Near and Middle East, where many of his get of exported. But Cornelia would not part with him, even temporarily. He only rarely left the farm, to be presented on special occasions such as the Noble Straight Egyptian Breeders Festival, and on such occasions, she always handled him herself.

"He was happiest when he was at home,"
says Cornelia's partner, Klaus Beste.

"He was a very sweet horse with a wonderful temperament.
A gentleman among horses."



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
