Photographer, Breeder

My name is Julia Dohmen, I'm 32 years old and live in Germany, near the Dutch and Belgian border.

Next to my job in the office at the haulage company that my husband runs with his mother, I started my own business as a horse photographer two years ago.

I approached the world of the Arabian horse by accident at the age of nine years old. At that time I rode a Haflinger horse who moved to the farm of a small Arabian horse breeder.

It took me some time to fall in love with the Arabian horses as I was only used to ponies and the Arabians were completely different than all the other horses I have met before.

But once I realized how special the Arabians are, there was no way back.

Together with the farm owner I visited famous German stud farms like Gut Alemich, Darius Arabians and Sax Arabians and also started to attend the All Nations Cup in Aachen year after year.

From the moment on I fell in love with the Arabians, I was fascinated by everything that had to do with breeding horses.

So after school I spent hours on my computer, learning pedigrees and horse names. My computer was full of pictures from stallions and mares from around the world and within a short time, I learned a lot about bloodlines and stud farms.

I got included in the choice of stallions and the management of the mares and foals at a really young age of 12 or 13 years old.

At the age of 14 I managed the first foal birth on my own as the farm owner was on vacation on that time. In 2009 I experienced the birth of a very beautiful, straight Russian colt, that is still by my side since then. I knew very early, that one day I want to create my own breeding program.

Many years later I met one of my biggest idols in the Arabian horse world: Johanna Ullström.

It was (and still is) very helpful to have someone by

my side who is willing to share his knowledge and experiences.

I first got the chance to lease a wonderful mare and after this I bought my first broodmare Tamarine JJ (Borsalino K x Tamara LL). This was really a dream come true.

Meanwhile I take care of four horses and expect two foals in 2025, what I am very excited about. Being rather introverted, it's not always that easy for me to get in touch with new people. I came to the Arabian horse world without knowing anyone. As the Arabian horse world is a close community where most of the people know each other for decades, I sometimes feel difficulties to find my place in the group.

But what I learned in the last years is, that it's worth to get out of my comfort zone. Once you are willing to try different things, new doors will open and new adventures will begin.

My dream is not only to become a renowned breeder but also to expand my business as an Arabian horse photographer or in another position in the Arabian horse world.

I think that you can only pursue your dream if you are willing to work hard, get out of your comfort zone and don't give up when it gets difficult.

And yes, maybe you have to work a little harder when you're a woman. As a mother of two young children, I have to be well organized even more. It might be a long way but I am sure that keeping your focus and dedication will always pay off.

In my experience it's important to look for the right people to work with. It is always easier to work with people that share similar values than with those who don't match your energy.

I don't like being too competitive. In my opinion life gets much easier when people support each other. When I look back, I would not be were I am today without the help of other breeders and friends.


I was enchanted by the beauty and character of the Arabian horse.

Always very drawn to the world of thoroughbred horses, I then obtained a license for flat racing, maintaining this competitive spirit even today. My passion for travel and horses led me to make a career shift a few years ago, founding a tour operator dedicated to equestrian tourism.
